I can be a little forgetful.

Which is why I make a list for the few items I am to pick up at the grocery store, otherwise, I would only get home with half of what I need. And, of course, I forget to take the list with me.

So I take a shower, step out of the shower, begin to dry my hair, only to realize I forgot to rinse out the shampoo. I step back in to rinse it out and get hit with that little blast of cold water as I turn on the faucet.

And on rare occasions, I have been known to forget where I hide Christmas gifts. One way to avoid this is to not buy Christmas gifts, that way you'll never forget where you hide them, although this practice is not without its own risks.

So I can be a little forgetful, but these are relatively small things, not that big of a deal, fairly unimportant.

Especially when compared with these women who go to the tomb on the first day of the week. They come with spices to tend to the body, but, as you know, the body wasn't there. And while they are trying to make heads or tails of it, two men in dazzling clothes appear and scare the daylights out of them.

Now, it *is* Easter morning, so maybe they shouldn't be so surprised by a couple of folks dressed in dazzling clothes.

These sharp-dressed men ask the women, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? Don't you remember that Jesus told you he would be crucified and that on the third day he would rise?"

I don't know about you, but I'm pretty sure I would remember that kind of thing. I might forget the grocery list, or to rinse my hair in the shower, or where I hid a Christmas gift or two, but if a friend tells me he's going to be crucified and that three days later he would rise again, I'm pretty sure I'd remember that.

"Don't you ladies remember?" The men ask.

"Oh, yeah, now that you mention it, I think he did say something like that."

How do did they forget?

Well, the truth is, they probably didn't forget. These women, like Jesus' other followers, probably didn't forget, because they never really understood in the first place. And besides, who could believe that such a thing was even possible? How could they believe he is alive after having witnessed his death and burial?

The women did not go to the tomb expecting to find him alive, because the truth is, no one expected the resurrection. The resurrection of Jesus from the dead is an unlikely ending to an unlikely story.

So unlikely, that when these women go back and tell the others, they don't believe it either. Luke writes, "But these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them."

"An idle tale" is a fairly generous translation of the Greek *leros*, which is the root of our word *delirious*. Simply put, the eleven disciples thought these women were nuts. "Ladies, please? Are you crazy? Calm down.

Simply put, the eleven disciples thought these women were nuts. "Ladies, please? Are you crazy? Calm down.

We know you miss him, we do too. But you saw what happened. You were there for goodness sakes! Get hold of yourselves. Enough with this foolishness."

And yet, Peter races off toward the tomb.

On the one hand: "This is crazy."

But on the other: "I'm going to check this out just in case."

In many ways, this is the juxtaposition of faith. The head says, "Nonsense!" But the heart is tugging at us, saying, "Could it be true? Is it possible?"

If we are honest, I think that's where we live—in the tension between belief and unbelief.

The great theologian, Karl Barth, says that what brings people to worship, not just on Easter, but on any given Sunday, is an unspoken question clinging to their hearts and minds, and that question is: "Is it true?" Is it true that God lives and gives us life?

Is it true that God not only established a routine, what we call the laws of nature, but then one-day God broke the routine and somehow raised Jesus from the dead?

Is it true that something so extraordinary happened on that morning that we can rebuild our lives on its foundation?

Is it true?

Some days it's rather easy to believe that it is true, and other days, not so much.

If I had been running "The Resurrection" I would have made sure that no one missed it. I'd have Jesus showing up everywhere, running around town, sneaking up on people, saying, "Boo! It's me, I'm back." Or as Fred Craddock once said, "I'd have Jesus sneak up on Pilate during his morning shave, pop up, right behind him in the mirror, and say, 'Hey Pilate, it's me, want to take another shot at it?!"

Yet, as magnificent as the resurrection was, it was really more of whisper. And if you weren't paying attention you might miss it altogether. In fact, the only ones who saw the resurrected Jesus were his followers. But if you are open to such things, and you lean in and listen closely, you can still hear resurrection-whispers.

And it sounds like this: "Love wins."

The good news of Easter is that the love of God known in Christ Jesus can never be extinguished.
