If you're reading this on the first day of 2015, there's a good chance you have not broken your New Year's resolution . . . yet. Even with best laid plans, most of us only last a week or two, if that, before we are back to our old ways. According to Forbes.com, only eight percent of the people who make New Year's resolutions actually keep them. (I read it on the internet so it must be true.)

Eight percent is not a high number. Nor a hopeful one. Eight percent is the kind of number that can turn you into a cynic—the kind of cynic who avoids the ninety-two percent failure rate by resolving to no longer make resolutions.

I've made resolutions before, and for the most part, have failed miserably. I've also played the cynic on more than a few occasions, and have almost always been right.

That's because it's easy to be the cynic. It's easy to say that people don't change, or that things will always be the way they are. If you take the cynical approach you'll be right most of the time, but it won't be much of an accomplishment.

And every once in a while you'll be wrong.

You'll be wrong because some people change. You'll be wrong because sometimes things get better. Every year there are some people who actually lose weight, get organized, spend less and save more, enjoy life to the fullest, stay fit and healthy, learn something new, quit smoking, help others achieve their dreams, fall in love, and spend more time with family. (These were the top ten resolutions for 2014 according to the University of Scranton.)

Most of us could probably stand improvement in at least one of these ten areas, and we shouldn't let the fear of failure keep us from trying. So don't let the cynics, or more likely, the cynic within, keep you from hoping and dreaming and working towards a better self and a better world for 2015.

Thinking about the New Year reminds me of these words: "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!" (II Corinthians 5:17).

This kind of newness doesn't happen all at once, and it doesn't happen without grace and hard work.

Longing to be made new is not naïve. Instead, it is the deep hope that the Creator hasn't given up on us, or on this world of ours. Resolve to not let cynicism have the final word.

Sole Hope Mission



Sisterhood is sponsoring a "party with a purpose" on Saturday, January 24 from 10 - noon. We will be cutting out shoes (from old denim jeans and 100% cotton fabric and milk jugs) to be sent to Uganda. This program is called *Sole Hope*.

Dru and Asher Collie (formerly of Asheville, now living with their two children in Uganda) are leading this program which is two-fold.

1. Without shoes, children get "jiggers" in their feet and their feet become infected. The shoes prevent this. There is no charge for the shoes given to the children.

2. Women in Uganda who sew together the shoes we cut are paid \$10.00 for each pair of shoes so they have income to provide for their own families.

- You can help by joining us with your fabric scissors and/or pinking shears on Saturday, January 24 from 10 to noon (followed by a soup lunch).
- You can donate \$10 to pay for a pair of completed shoes (make checks payable to *Sole Hope*.)
- You can donate old denim jeans and/or 100% cotton fabric.
