

Chat With the Preacher

This is something I wrote for the Tryon Daily Bulletin, and while we (FBC Tryon) always need your financial support, and while some of your support actually goes to Thermal Belt Outreach Ministires, Lent is an appropriate time to remember our neighbors in need.

Lent and Thermal Belt Outreach Ministry

The season of Lent is a forty-day journey though the wilderness of repentance and reflection. In the Western Church, this journey begins on Ash Wednesday. Ashes made from last year's palms are placed on foreheads in the shape of a cross, and the words "For you are dust, and to dust you shall return" are whispered as a stark reminder that our lives are fragile and finite.

The prescribed Gospel reading for Ash Wednesday comes from Matthew 6, which is located in the middle of the Sermon on the Mount—the pinnacle of Jesus' teaching. The reading addresses three imperatives of Jewish faith: almsgiving, prayer, and fasting. Jesus encouraged his followers to perform these practices with discretion and faithfulness, unlike those who did so for show.

These three practices are also important for the Christian tradition. And they do not appear in the Ash Wednesday readings by accident. Almsgiving, prayer, and fasting are three expected Lenten practices.

But whether you observe Lent or not, and whether you are religious or not, I want to offer one of these practices for your consideration--almsgiving. Almsgiving is the practice of giving to those in need. And there is a simple way you can give to those in need in Polk County— Thermal Belt Outreach Ministry (full disclosure: I serve on the board of TBOM). While Thermal Belt Outreach Ministry provides several kinds of assistance, food assistance is at its core. Here are a few staggering facts about hunger:

-Hunger is the world's #1 health risk. It kills more people than AIDS, malaria and tuberculosis combined.

-One in seven people in the world will go to bed hungry tonight.

-Over 300 million children go to bed hungry every day.

-Every day, almost 16,000 children die from hungerrelated causes. That's one child every five seconds.

The reasons for hunger are many and complex, and the strategies to eliminate hunger are varied. But one thing is for sure; hunger is not the result of scarcity. There is more than enough food in the world to go around. The question is: Will we do our part to make sure there's an equitable distribution?

Near the end of Matthew's Gospel, in a climatic scene known as the parable of the sheep and the goats, Jesus describes that in the divine economy, whenever you feed the hungry (or give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, care for the sick, visit those in prison) you are actually feeding him:"Just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me" (Matthew 25:40b). Likewise, when our neighbors go hungry, it is as if we have failed to feed Jesus himself. Startling news for those of us who claim to follow him.

So whether you give your finances and time to TBOM, or to some other worthy group, please give generously. You won't regret it. As the writer of Hebrews proclaims, "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it" (Hebrews 13:2).

PARTY WITH A PURPOSE

On Saturday, January 24, twenty-four members of Tryon First Baptist Church ages 11 to 81 years old worked together to cut out 60 pairs of shoes from old denim jeans and cotton cloth and plastic milk jugs. These will be sent to Sole Hope -- a project that provides shoes to children in Uganda. This "party with a purpose" was directed by Beth Thomas of Tryon.

Many children in Uganda who do not have any shoes get "jiggers" (sand fleas that infest and infect the feet). When these shoe "kits" reach Uganda, they are sewn together by women of the village – using old bicycle tires as soles. These women are paid a fair wage which helps them support their families. Each pair of shoes can be "sponsored" with a \$10 donation which helps transport the kits to Uganda, pays the fair wage and provides some medical supplies.

This project began in Asheville when a young mother named Dru Collie learned about the "jiggers" and the children in Uganda. Dru and her husband and two children have since moved to Uganda to direct the operation on site.

Keith Collins of Tryon First Baptist Church provided 98 milk jugs which were used to cut out sole supports for the shoes. In April our youth group (Refuge) will be having another "party with a purpose" to cut more shoes to send to Uganda. For more information, contact Judy Lair at 894-8744 or Di Greene at 894-5095.


