

Chat With the Preacher

October is full of great opportunities for worship and service.

I hope you will take advantage of these opportunities:

-The #GraceItForward Mission Day is a great way to exercise your faith in our community. There is still time to participate!

-On Sunday, October 4, we will celebrate the baptisms of three youth—Stephen Morris, Sydney Waldman, and Luke Walker. We will also gather at the Lord's Table to share communion and to participate in World Communion Sunday.

-On Sunday, October 11, Guy Sayles, former pastor of FBC Asheville, will present the topic: "Learning from Hard Experiences": an exploration of how difficult realities--like cancer and its treatment--can lead us to deeper faith and to a more meaningful life. We'll begin our time together in the Activity Building at 9:30am. Guy is a gifted preacher and writer who will help us think deeply about life, faith, and suffering.

-On Sunday, October 25 Pepper Choplin, composer, conductor and humorist, will lead us in worship. Pepper is an accomplished composer and musician. He sings and plays piano, trumpet, guitar, and banjo. His compositions are diverse and varied, including folk, gospel, classical, and jazz.

The Challenge And Gift Of Time, by Guy Sayles

Many of us have a troubled relationship with time. Carl Honore wrote an interesting book, *In Praise of Slowness: How a Worldwide Movement Is Challenging the Cult of Speed*, the idea for which came to him as he rushed through an airport and saw a book entitled *The One-Minute Bedtime Story*. His first thought was that this was an answer to prayers. He'd been in a tug-of-war with his two-year-old son over reading a story each night.

Honore had wanted a way to get through the stories more quickly so that he could get back to work; but, at the airport, he was struck by a crucial insight: "Have I gone completely insane? . . . I am Scrooge with a stopwatch, obsessed with saving every last scrap of time, a minute here, a few seconds there."

All is not well between us and time.

Time flies when you're having fun; but, at the best moments, it seems that time stands still. But, the best moments aren't necessarily the easiest moments, so that some people remember hard times as good times. Most of those who think hard times were good times are old-timers.

Children like to hear about even older times than the old-timers lived through, so we tell them stories that begin, "Once upon a time." In one of those stories, Alice in Wonderland, Through the Looking Glass, the Red Queen says: "Now here, you see, it takes all the running you can do to keep in the same place. If you want to get somewhere else, you must run at least twice as fast as that." These kinds of stories tell children, and the rest of us, to run fast so that we don't run out of time, not to waste time, and certainly not to kill time. We try, instead, to save time, to find time, but if we can't find it, to make up for lost time.

We attempt to manage time so that we have quality time with the people we care about; but, we don't have as much quality time as we'd like because it depends on having at least a small quantity of time that can be turned into quality time.

Some people are stingy with time, because "time is money." So, they hardly ever let themselves take down time. For a few, time's up before they are able to call time out. Have you had hard seasons where you felt like you were doing time?

The Jewish and Christian understanding of time grows from the gift of Sabbath which Abraham Joshua Heschel called "a cathedral in time"—a sanctuary of worship, rest, and delight in the midst of the distractions and distortions which threaten to dehumanize us. *-con't. next page*

The Sabbath principle teaches us that we are not defined by our work, our productivity, and our status; we are not slaves to the demands of other people or our own expectations. We are, instead, defined by the love of God, a love which we celebrate and return in worship, which we savor in the gifts and delights of nature, and which we share in our relationships with our neighbors. God's gift of time is patterned and rhythmic: work and worship, work and rest, work and delight.

In his poignant book, *Learning to Fall*, about his slow dying with ALS, Philip Simmons wrote:

I think if we are honest with ourselves, we can agree that our busyness—whether of body or mind—is often a distraction, a way of avoiding others, avoiding intimacy, avoiding ourselves. We keep busy to push back our fears, our loneliness, our self-doubt, our questions about purposes and ends. We want to know we matter; we want to know our lives are worthwhile. And when we're not sure, we work that much harder, we worry that much more.

Simmons identified the trouble with us that makes our trouble with time: we are hurrying to outrun our fears; we are working to ensure that we are worthwhile, and we are chasing a sense that life matters and that we matter.

Sabbath invites us to another way of inhabiting time: to allow love to heal our fears and befriend us in our loneliness, to see that our purpose, our "end," is, as the old catechism puts it, "to glorify God and enjoy God forever," and to rest in the profound awareness that our worth comes from our identity as children of God.

Guy is also a member of the Board of Directors of the Baptist Center for Ethics.

PEPPER CHOPLIN TO LEAD WORSHIP OCTOBER 25



Mark your calendar now for a very special weekend with composer Pepper Choplin! Pepper will be leading our worship and sharing his music with us on Sunday, October 25. He will have a special rehearsal with the choir on Saturday, October 24 at 7:00 pm. We are so fortunate to have someone of his caliber spend time with us. Pepper Choplin is a genuine and caring person who possesses the gift of music and the heart of a minister.

WHO IS PEPPER CHOPLIN?

Pepper Choplin is a full-time composer, conductor and humorist. He has gained a reputation as one of the most creative writers in church music today. Beginning his music training at the age of four, he grew up singing and playing piano, trumpet, guitar and banjo. With a Bachelor of Music degree from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro, he went on to earn a Master of Music degree in composition from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

With a diverse musical background, Choplin's compositions are as varied as folk, gospel, classical, and jazz. His published work includes over 250 anthems for church and school choirs, 16 church cantatas, and a book of piano arrangements. Over 100 groups have commissioned him to write original works for them. An original hymn, "Come to the Water" appears in the recent Baptist hymnal, *Celebrating Grace*. His anthems consistently appear in the top seller lists of publishers and distributors. Since 1991, his choral music has sold several million copies. Each week, thousands of singers present his music in churches and schools in the United States and around the world. In 2013, he made his Carnegie Hall debut in a joint concert with Joseph Martin. In 2015, Choplin traveled to Lincoln Center where he conducted his new cantata, *Our Father*, based on the Lord's Prayer.

Beyond his choral music, Choplin has produced two humorous CDs and an inspirational recording. In his solo concerts, he moves audiences with his powerful ballads and his hilarious humor.

Currently, he attends Greystone Baptist Church in Raleigh, North Carolina, where he served as Minister of Music for twenty-two years. There in his hometown, Choplin has conducted several mass performances of his Easter and Christmas cantatas in Meymandi Auditorium (home to the NC Symphony) with over two hundred voices and full orchestra. Pepper is married and has three daughters.

First Baptist Youth and Parents:

Here are a few reminders about youth group:

- Refuge is the name of our Sunday evening youth gathering, and it is open to all middle and high school students.
- Refuge meets from 6pm to 7:30pm.
- Youth are welcome and encouraged to bring friends.
- We engage in serious Bible study and faith formation.
- We always share a meal (most of the time there is no charge for this meal).
- Occasionally there are special events that require money, if money is ever an issue please let us know.
- We play fun, goofy games.
- If you need help with transportation let us know.
- We encourage youth to think seriously about their faith.
- We welcome questions and doubts.
- When it's time to be serious we collect their cell phones.
- If your youth has special needs (dietary or otherwise) please let us know.

-These are our expectations:

Be Respectful *Do to others as you would have them do to you. Luke 6:31 (NRSV)*

No bullying/making fun/leaving folks out, etc. Use appropriate language. Only one person talks at a time. Place your phone in "cell jail" when it's time to be serious. No "smooching!"

Be Faithful *Love the Lord your God with all your passion and prayer and muscle and intelligence—and love your neighbor as well as you do yourself. Luke 10:27 (The Message)*

Act like a follower of Jesus. Be kind, practice forgiveness, welcome strangers. Reflect God's love at church, home, and school. Attend Sunday School, Worship, and Refuge as often as possible.
